Course Description

This course provides an introduction to various aspects of university education and life at UConn. By alternating Professor's teaching and Facilitators' peer-advising sessions, this course aims to assist first-year Honors students to identify personalized strategies to achieve academic, personal, and professional development, as well as to explore university resources through a series of structured educational experience. As a member of the UConn Honors Program, students will have both one-to-one and group interactions with the Facilitators to understand a variety of academic and non-academic opportunities at UConn and build peer networks to enrich their college life in a positive and supporting learning environment.

Mission and Vision of UConn Honors Program

Assignments

1. One-on-One Meetings

Individual students will be required to sign up for two one-on-one meetings with one facilitator over the course of the semester. The first sign-up will be on **September 7th** and the second sign-up will be on **November 9th**. The first of these meetings is conducted with the purpose of discussing their transition to college and the UCONN community, their personal goals and how to attain them, and how to succeed and develop both in the classroom and beyond. The second meeting will be used to assess how and to what degree the individual met their goals and how they can continue to progress. Facilitators will also collect information for students' final papers in the second meeting.

2. Center for Career Development: Your First College Resume

- ✚ This will require a **Portfolium Account**.
- ✚ Students should have created an account on Portfolium by **September 21st**, when the facilitators will verify if all students have created their accounts.
- ✚ Students will create a first-draft resume BEFORE class on **September 28th** with materials provided on HuskyCT.
- ✚ Students are required to attend the Center for Career Development's Resume Writing Presentation on **September 28th**. Please bring your first-draft resume to take notes on and ask questions.
- ✚ Full details about this assignment will be provided at a later date.
- ✚ After attending the class, students will get two weeks to create a final and updated draft of their resume, which will be submitted to the facilitators.
