



# American Dreamers: Voice Of Hope, Music of Freedom

# Who is John Daversa?

- John Daversa is the Chair of the Studio Music as well as the Jazz Department at the University of Miami Frost School Of Music
- He's a performer, composer, and educator
- Daversa having grandparents who immigrated from Italy and being him being an educator inspired him to help Dreamers voices be heard
- Won 3 Grammys for the album American Dreamers



# What is DACA?

- DACA stands for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals and it's a program that undocumented immigrants can apply to
- Those who can apply are people who were brought to the US when they were younger than 16
- Dreamers are those who are DACA recipients
- DACA provides Dreamers with the protection from being deported as well as many other benefits such as a work permit
- The DACA application fee is about \$500

# Purpose

- John Daversa wanted to give Dreamers a platform where they could tell their stories and be heard
- He wanted to show how resources like DACA are important to Dreamers
- The proceeds that were made from the album were going to help Dreamers pay the fees when re-applying for DACA

# Who is featured in the album?

- 53 Dreamers were featured in the album from 17 different states and 17 different countries
- Some of the countries include Belize, Brazil, Canada, Mexico, Pakistan, Senegal, and Venezuela
- Dreamers sang, performed poetry, and even rapped
- Professional musicians were also featured on the album
